Upon successful completion of the interview, the director updates the system, which enables the student to complete the application process.



#### Freemasonry and the Age of Enlightenment

Over the past year the Everett Valley Rite Bulletin has featured articles on several philosophers and scientists from the Age of Enlightenment. But why were some of these men attracted to Masonic guilds? One theory we explored was that as these guilds were approved by the state and church; they may have been a haven to discuss and explore controversial ideas. Are there other possibilities?

According to Masonic legend, during his time in Egypt Abraham shared his knowledge of science with Euclid. Euclid attached the names geometry and masonry to that science and passed on his knowledge to his students. The Cooke Manuscript (c. 1450) tells us that all other sciences are descended from geometry. From Euclid and Egypt, geometry, science, and masonry spread to the rest of the world.

The earliest extant Masonic document is the Regius Poem (or Halliwell M.S.). Scholars date this manuscript between the mid 900's to the most accepted date of 1390. This manuscript outlines seven sciences in this order:

Grammar

Dialect (logic)

Rhetoric

Music

Astronomy

Arithmetic

Geometry

A translation of a small portion of the poem reads, ".... That can separate falsehood from truth,

I know these be the sciences seven, Who useth them well he may have heaven."

According to the Regius Poem, the Cooke Manuscript, and other early Masonic documents all seven sciences are important to masons and that importance continues to this day as told in our Fellow craft Degree.

It is understandable that one who builds with stone have a thorough knowledge of arithmetic and geometry, but why the other five? Is it a reach to think that these other sciences were taught and passed down from generation to generation in the operative masons' lodges?

With the fall of the Roman Empire (c. 410 C.E.) came the fall of secular schools. During the Dark Ages and beyond, the task of education was assumed by the church. As the dominant religion, the Catholic Church educated the young in reading and writing; next was taught the Trivium; grammar, rhetoric, and logic. Then to older students, the Quadrivium; arithmetic, geometry, astronomy,

and music.

According to some scholars, young students only received enough education (reading, writing, grammar, rhetoric, and logic) to enable them to join guilds. It was the wealthy and prosperous that went on to formally learn the higher sciences (Quadrivium) and perhaps the needed specifics of these higher sciences were also taught by the guilds.

It is not a great leap of faith to understand that at least the mason's guilds had knowledge beyond just the science of construction. Below is a paragraph from the Cooke M.S. that indicates operative masons knew what was contained in several world history books.

> "And now, I will enter further into the matter You must know that among all the crafts followed by man in this world, Masonry has the greatest renown end the largest share of this science of Geometry, as is stated in history, such as the Bible, and the Master of History, and in the Policronicon a well authenticated (or trustworthy) chronicle. and in the history called Beda De Imagine Mundi, and Isodorus Ethomolegiarum Methodius Episcopus & Martiris. And many others say that Masonry is the chief part of Geometry and so methinks it may well be said, for it was the first founded, as is stated in the Bible, in the first book of Genesis and the fourth chapter. And moreover all the learned authors above cited agree thereto. And some of them affirm it more openly and plainly, precisely as in Genesis in the Bible."

In England and Europe, the Dark or early Middle Ages were times of superstition and lack of literary, architectural, & cultural achievement.

The Church became the biggest institution of stability. It was up to the monks to copy the literature and scientific texts of the Roman period, and to a lesser extent the Greek period. These copies were in Latin so only those who could read Latin would understand them. And, as the Church had its own agenda much of the copied "science" texts were influenced by that agenda.

The Dark Ages were also a time of faith. People sought God through the rituals of the Catholic Church or through other forms of worship. As faith is based more on emotion rather than the intellectual, faith rather than fact was dominant. The higher sciences continued to be shaped by religion

and the Renaissance there was a renewed interest in humanism and a questioning of what we refer to now as Scholasticism ("...a medieval school of philosophy that employed a critical method of philosophical analysis predicated upon a Latin Catholic theistic curriculum which dominated teaching in the medieval universities in Europe from about 1100 to 1700"). This period is where we see the likes of Da Vinci, the Guttenberg printing press, and the Reformation.

Those that questioned facts as defined by the Church could be subject to the wrath of the Church. One of the most known targets was Galileo Galilei (1564-1642) who was convicted of heresy for popularizing the heliocentric theory of Copernicus (1473-1543) that the earth was not the center of the universe. The control of "acceptable science" was in the hands of the Church well before 1100 (but challenged during the Renaissance) and continued into the Age of Enlightenment.

By the Age of Enlightenment, reason and empirical sciences are taking the place of Scholasticism, theistic curriculums are being rejected. There is a rediscovery and study of the ancient Greek and Arabian texts during the Late Middle Ages. With the advent of the printing press these texts gained wider circulation. There begins a search crets that are lost to us were discovered but more likely for truth through reason and science.

The early Dark Ages were marked by a lack of large new stone buildings. Few were to appear for hundreds of years. Practical building knowledge should have been lost during generations of unused, yet - beginning around the Late Middle Age we see the building of magnificent cathedrals. The old knowledge had not been lost.

In 1634 there is a record of the first non-stonemasons being accepted into a lodge. Six middle-class men were made masons. Nothing was particularly special about these men; they were not royalty nor of high birth. It was not until 1641 that a man of some prominence, Sir Robert Moray, joined a Lodge. Then in 1646, Elias Ashmole became a mason. What is not recorded is why they were attracted to Masonic guilds/lodges. Based on extant documents from Masonic guilds these men found:

Legends of the origins of science

Legends that point to masons as the caretakers and descendants of the sciences

Rites of initiation

Importance of science

The responsibilities of those in charge (the Master Mason)

Mouth to ear communications of "secrets"

The importance of religion

Could it be that seeing the cathedrals of the Church,

the aqueducts of the Romans, the Egyptian pyramids, the Greek temples, and other magnificent structures; and hearing the legends recorded in the old documents, made these non-masons believe that the Masonic guilds held some secret knowledge?

The rites of initiation in the Gnostic and ancient religions may have been attractive to those men during the Age of Enlightenment. The initiatory rites of the operative mason may have seemed like those of the ancients. As the old religions had time frames for learning and advancement so to the Masonic guilds (seven years).

Besides the seven sciences, the Regius Poem has fifteen points and fifteen articles. The Cooke M.S. has nine articles and nine points that give instructions to masons on both how to work and personal conduct. Many of these ideals and instructions are included in the charges of the Dowland M.S. (c. 1550). These points, articles and charges tell masons the importance of science, to be true to your work, how to interact with your fellows, and the importance of worship.

It is likely that if they had not read the Regius Poem (c. 1390) or the Cooke M.S. (c. 1450), they would have been exposed to the legends and principles espoused by the operative guilds. And perhaps, even as today, Masonic secrets were suggested or inferred. Maybe after joining, sewhat was discovered was what we are taught and practice in lodge today.

The Age of Enlightenment is also called the Age of Reason. Some say the Enlightenment was an early part of the Age of Reason. The seven sciences named in the Regius Poem have something in common: reason - not faith, not superstition, not fear but reason. Empirical reason rather than metaphysical speculation. Why were they of such value to masons? Paraphrasing the Regius Poem and the Cooke M.S., the seven sciences, more especially geometry, are used to discern truth from falsehood.

The work of Galileo, Sir Francis Bacon, and others inspired John Locke, often called the most influential of the Enlightenment thinkers. It is Locke who is considered the first of England's empiricists and influenced later thinkers such as Rousseau, Voltaire, and American revolutionaries. Locke is also called the "Father of Liberalism." Liberalism defined as personal liberty, consent of the governed and equality before the law. These principles include ideals such as freedom of religion, democracy, separation of church & state, fraternity, and individual rights. Sound familiar?

Many of these concepts were included in the creation of our form of government but they did not all originate Continued on Page 10

with the philosophers of the Age of Enlightenment nor were they just incorporated into Freemasonry at the founding of our modern craft. Looking at early documents of operative masons, we see some of these concepts and principles.

Cooke M.S. c. 1450

The which masters were called masters of nobility, of knowledge and skill in that art. Nevertheless they commanded that they that were of less knowledge should not be called servants or subjects, but fellows, on account of the nobility of their gentle blood.

#### Regius Poem c. 1390

That the masters do the lord no prejudice, To take the lord for his 'prentice, As much as his fellows do, in all wise. For in that craft they be full perfect, So is not he, you must see it. Also it were against good reason, To take his hire as his fellows do.

So not only could operative Masonic guilds/lodges have been safe havens for men to discuss ideas not in line with the church or state, but perhaps the teachings, rules, legends, customs, and ideals of masons were a source for some of the ideals that grew into the Enlightenment and the Age of Reason.

Recall the section of the Regius Poem,
".... That can separate falsehood from truth,
I know these be the sciences seven,
Who useth them well he may have heaven."

In the book *The Builders a Story and Study of Freema-sonry*, the author asks the question; why, in the late 1600s, so many soldiers, scholars, antiquarians, clergymen, lawyers, and nobility asked to be accepted into the order of operative freemasons. He then answers his own question; It was not for social associations; not to learn signs and passwords and certainly not to learn the operative mason's trade. Rather "...these men saw in Masonry a deposit of the high and simple wisdom of old, preserved in tradition and taught in symbols, little understood by many members of the order-and this is what they sought to bring to light, turning history into allegory and legend into drama, and making it a teacher of wise and beautiful truth."

Freemasonry is a search for light (truth) and is this not what the Age of Reason/Enlightenment was about and is this not what we are looking for today?


#### Washington Masonic Code Section17.14 B.L. Non-Payment of Dues (N.P.D.).

"The annual dues of members of Lodges shall be payable in advance of the first day of January of each year.

Any member who has not paid his dues for the current year on or before December 31st thereof, (12-31-21) and who has not been granted a remission of his dues or an extension for a definite period in which to pay his dues, shall cease to be a member of the Lodge and his name must be dropped from the roll." (See 17.13; 17.14; 17.15)

At the present time - the Scottish Rite - Valley of Everett - Orient of Washington reflects the present defaulted dues status as follows: 29 members due for 2022 at \$150 each; eight (8) members are due for both 2021-2022 at \$250 each; and six (6) members were due for the period of 2020-2021 and 2022 at \$350 each (this last group were submitted for suspension NPD on December 31st, 2021).

Total outstanding defaulted dues = \$8,450.
