This is the month that we celebrate Memorial Day which will fall on Monday - May 29th, 2023. While surfing the internet I found this interesting article on a fellow Freemason by the name of John Logan who had some contributions on the Holiday. I thought that it would appropriate to share this with all of our Masonic brothers and their families.

RE: Memorial Day

Logan Lodge No. 575 in Indianapolis was chartered in 1888, and is named after Major General John A. Logan, one of the most famous and popular Union Army generals of the Civil War. After the war, Logan became a fierce Republican, an Illinois senator, and presided over the impeachment trial of Andrew Johnson. He was a staunch supporter for the cause of Veterans, and was one of the primary advocates of creating Memorial Day as a national holiday (a day that is important all across America).

Brother Logan was raised as a Master Mason in Mitchell Lodge No. 85 in Pinckneyville, Illinois.

Memorial Day (originally known as Decoration Day) was officially declared on May 5th, 1868 by General Logan, in his role as national commander of the fraternal group, the *Grand Army of the Republic* – commonly referred to as the GAR (there is a local GAR cemetery situated in our immediate area at: 8601 Riverview Road; Snohomish, WA 98290). It was first observed on May 30th of that year when flowers were placed on the graves of both Union and Confederate soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery.



So I sat and waited, watching as all of these ice cream cones were ordered and taken away.

Here is what I found rather shocking...

Not a single person donated the requested dollar to charity.

These were people of all ages, even the slightly elderly looking well dressed couple that came in for their free ice cream and then took it out to their fancy new luxury car.

Not one would give a buck.

Out of all those people, I also only saw two order anything in addition to their free ice cream.

The whole thing was surprising to me.

But more importantly, it was sad. Quite sad.

Here was a business, working to raise a few bucks for a good cause by giving away one of its products in exchange for a very small donation, and not a single person I saw was willing to donate.

Extreme selfishness is rampant in our society today, and harmful to it.

If you become a Mason you put into

Masonry more than money, more than anything you have or possess, that you measure by pounds or

shillings, you put your life into it. Unless you can and do put your life into it, unless you let Masonry direct your life, you have no investment, you get little or nothing from Masonry.

Life is in constant conflict between good and evil. Masonry aids the Mason to Choose the good rather than the evil. Dominating the Mason's life Masonry creates the habit of choosing the good, with the result that it helps him to develop character. You may have wealth and put your money in to paying propositions but you can make no investment that will pay you greater dividends than Masonry will if you make Masonic effort to build character.

The History of Freemasons For the Month of May

May 06—In 1851, Inventor John Gorrie was granted a U.S. patent for an ice-making machine. Bro. Gorrie's invention was the first U.S. patent for mechanical refrigeration. His machine was initially designed for treating yellow fever. Bro. Gorrie is considered the father of refrigeration and air-conditioning: His statue appears in Statuary hall of the US Capitol. A bridge, a high school, a chapter of Order of Eastern Star, and a Liberty Ship were named in his honor. He was a physician by profession. He was a charter member of Franklin Lodge No. 6, Appalachia, Fl, and was later its secretary/treasurer.

May 08—In 1792, Bro. and President George Washington signed an act that authorized the mint of the first U.S. copper coins. Individuals involved in using coins other than the legal cents and half-cents would be penalized with a \$10 fine. These coins were the predecessors of today's pennies.

May 10—In 1850 at Glascow, Scotland, was born Bro. Thomas Johnstone Lipton, Scottish Merchant who founded Lipton, Ltd. In 1898, a company known for its tea, coffee and soups,. A famous merchant, he was equally famous as a yachtsman, having raced his yacht, Shamrock in the America's Cup five times between 1899 and 1930. He was knighted in 1898 and made a baronet in 1902. Bro. Lipton was initiated in Scotia Lodge 178, Glascow, Scotland, in 1870. He died October 2, 1931 in London.

May 13—By 1938 Bro. Louis Armstrong was already a nationally famous jazz cornet and trumpet player, singer, and bandleader. Having brought New Orleans-style jazz to an unprecedentedly wide audience, he had almost single-handedly transformed the music from a group form into an art for the individual soloist. On May 13 of that year, in a studio session in New York, Bro. Louis Armstrong and his ten-piece orchestra recorded a jazz arrangement of the religious song, "When the Saints Go Marching In." Enormously popular, the tune became a jazz standard, as well as one of Bro. Armstrong's signature songs. The recording captured the exuberance and technical virtuosity of Bro. Armstrong's unique trumpet style. Bro. Louis Armstrong's Masonic affiliation was Prince Hall.

May 24—1927, Bro. Charles Lindbergh, barely 25 years old, took off from Roosevelt Field in Long Island, NY, aboard the Spirit of St. Louis to begin his historic solo flight to France. 3,600 miles and 33 and a half hours later he descended quietly onto a runway at Le Bourget Field in Paris. :Well, I made it," said the quiet Midwesterner before he was mobbed and carried off by an ecstatic crowd gathered to greet him. The lanky flier won a hotly contested \$25,000 -prize for his non-stop effort but seemed surprised by the worldwide adulation his flight generated. His main goal, he said, was to further aviation. Bro. Lindbergh was raised at Keystone Lodge No. 243, St. Louis, MO. He was also a member of St. Louis Chapter No. 33, National Sojourners, and of the Scios of San Diego, CA. On the flight to Paris he wore the square and compasses on his jacket as a good luck charm, and his plane also bore a Masonic tag from his Lodge. He died in 1974.

May 29 –In 1866, US President and Bro. Andrew Johnson, issued a proclamation giving a general amnesty to all who participated in the rebellion against the United States. High ranking members of the Confederate government and military and those who owned more than \$20,000 in property were excepted and had to apply individually to the President for a pardon. Once an oath of allegiance was taken, all former property rights, except those in slaves, were returned to their former owners.

May 31 - In 1898, at Bowerville, OH, was born American religious leader Bro. Norman Vincent Peale was best known for his 1952 book, "The Power of Positive Thinking," which combined religion with psychiatry. He served for many. many years as a Grand Chaplain of the Grand Lodge of New York and he was an outstanding spokesperson on behalf of Free Masonry. He was a minister at the Marble Collegiate Church at New York, NY, and served as President of the Council of Churches. He was a member of Milbourne Lodge No. 1062, Brooklyn, NY. In 1972 he received New York Grand lodge's Distinguished Achievement Award.

The Enlightenment and Masonry

As Blue Lodge Masons, we are instructed that modern Freemasonry began on June 24, 1717, when four existing London lodges assembled at the Goose and Gridiron Ale House to form the first Grand Lodge, drawing on the work of Albert Mackey. This is not to say that speculative Freemasonry did not exist prior to 1717. Indeed, we are also instructed that speculative freemasonry grew out of operative lodges of masons over a long period of time. Unfortunately, the historical record is vague and enigmatic. Our first confirmed admission of a speculative mason into an existing lodge of masons is of Sir Robert Moray (1608-1673), who was admitted into the Lodge of Edinburgh on May 20, 1641. Moreover, in a diary entry dated October 16, 1646, Elias Ashmole (1617-1692), notes that "I was made a Free Mason at Warrington in Lancashire, with Coll: Henry Mainwaring of Karincham in Cheshire." How far back in time speculative masonry goes beyond these historical references is unknown. But "how".
