### Technology to Strengthen Our Valley

Each quarter, the Grand Commander of the Scottish Rite, Southern Jurisdiction, hosts an online Zoom meeting to update Valleys on the state of the Rite, respond to questions, and share ideas gathered from Valleys across the jurisdiction. These meetings are an important forum for exchanging ideas and understanding what is going on within the Rite.

During the April meeting, one question asked by the Grand Commander was; What is your Valley currently doing electronically that was once managed on paper? Many Valleys reported that the majority of their records are now digital, with only a few exceptions such as the Tyler's register and degree scripts. One Valley described using a laptop and spreadsheet to track attendance by scanning membership cards. Like many Valleys, we already record meeting minutes electronically, improving long-term recordkeeping and accessibility.

The Grand Commander talked about perhaps using electronic tablets for degree scripts. As I recall he said in his home Valley, a generous donation allowed tablets to use, simplify updates, and ensure consistency across degrees. While not every solution fits every Valley, these examples demonstrate how technology can support our work rather than replace it.

A point emphasized during the discussion was the appropriate use of technology in the lodge room. Opening and closing ritual of the Scottish Rite may not be broadcast;

however, educational presentations and business portions of meetings may be shared electronically. When used within these guidelines, technology can expand participation and enhance education, particularly for members who are unable to attend in person.

Our Supreme Council has around 900 educational videos available online—more than any other fraternal organization. With proper equipment, Valleys can selectively incorporate these types of resources to enrich programs and discussions while minimizing the change in character of our meetings.

Here in our Valley, we have already taken a few steps forward. Our library is equipped to support hybrid meetings for the Board of Trustees and Executive Committee through a wall-mounted television, a small computer,

camera, microphone, and a connection to our high speed our high-speed Wi-Fi network. This arrangement is available for use by all Masonic bodies meeting in our building, making it both efficient and cost-effective.

Several months ago, a proposal was made to extend similar capabilities into the lodge room itself. Blue Lodges meeting in the building expressed willingness to assist with the purchase of shared equipment. A sound bar has already been donated to the Valley (thank you, Tony). While concerns about safely moving a large TV on a rolling cart delayed further action, the underlying concept remains important: thoughtful use of technology can strengthen both communication and education within our Valley.

As equipment has become more affordable and easier to install safely, it may now be time to revisit this idea using wall-mounted displays rather than a mobile cart. While some existing wall-mounted furnishings would need to be relocated, the benefits—improved visibility, safer setup, and better educational opportunities—could outweigh the inconvenience.

As we look at extending hybrid meeting capabilities into the Lodge room, the overall approach remains straight

Forward. A practical setup would include wall-mounted flat-screen displays for presentation and educational content, a dedicated computer to manage video and online connections, and a camera and audio system to support members who attend remotely. Wireless microphones and an integrated speaker system, combined with our existing high-speed Wi-Fi, would ensure clear communication for both in-person and online participants.

Taken together, these elements represent a simple, scalable way to enhance communication and education without altering the character of our meetings.

This returns us to the broader message shared by the Grand Commander. Across the jurisdiction, Valleys are adopting technology thoughtfully—preserving records, improving education, and staying connected to their members—while remaining firmly grounded in Masonic tradition. Used wisely and within established guidelines, technology does not replace what makes the Scottish Rite meaningful; it supports and extends it. As our Valley considers future steps, the challenge is not whether to use modern tools, but how to do so in a way that strengthens fellowship, honors our obligations, and prepares us well for the years ahead.

# The History of Freemasons For the Month of May

**May 5**—In 1904 Bro. Denton "Cy" Young pitched baseball's first perfect game, not allowing a single opposition player to reach first base. Brother Young's outstanding performance led the Boston Americans in a 3-0- victory over Philadelphia in the American League. The Cy Young Award for Pitching was named in his honor. He was a member of Mystic Tie Lodge 194, Urichsville, OH, He died November 4, 1955, and was buried with his Masonic apron on.

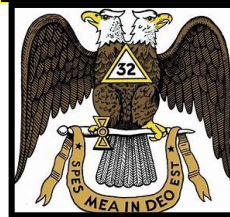
**May 9**—In 1800, in Torrington, CT, was born abolitionist leader to be, Bro. John Brown. He was leader of an attack on Harper's Ferry, October 16, 1859, intended to give impetus to the movement for the escape and freedom for slaves. His aim was frustrated and he was hanged December 2, 1859, at Charles Town WV. Bro. Brown was raised in Hudson Lodge No. 68, Hudson, OH, on May 11, 1859, serving as Junior Deacon, 1825-26. Shortly after 1826, he moved to Pennsylvania and with the Anti-Masonic movement, renounced Freemasonry, though his son, Bro. John Brown, Jr. became a Freemason and at his death, was buried with Masonic honors.

**May 12**—In 1937, Bro. George VI (Bro. Albert Windsor) was crowned King of England, following the abdication of his brother Bro. Edward VIII. His coronation was the first ceremony of this magnitude to be televised. The actions of Bro. and King George VI and the royal family during World War II were perceived as courageous by their English subjects, George VI remained king until his death in 1952: He was initiated in Naval Lodge No. 2612 in December, 1919. In 1922 he was appointed Senior Grand Warden of the United Grand Lodge of England, and in 1924, Provincial Grand Master for Middlesex. In 1936, he became Grand Master Mason of Scotland and affiliated with the lodge of Glamis, Scotland. He was a very active Mason in his life. Said he of Masonry: " The world today does require spiritual and moral regeneration. I have no doubt, after many years as a member of our Order, that Freemasonry can play a most important part in this vital need."

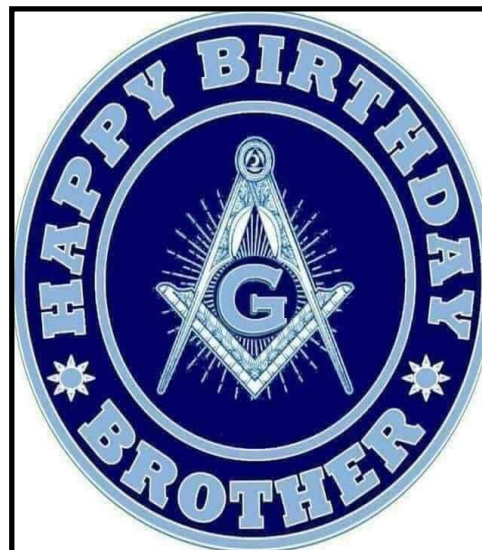
**May 29**—In 1927, Bro. Charles Lindbergh, barely 25 years old, took off from Roosevelt Field in Long Island, NY, aboard the Spirit of St. Louis to begin his historic solo flight to France. 3,600 miles and 33 and a half hours later he descended quietly onto a runway at Le Bourget Field in Paris. "Well, I made it," said the quiet Midwesterner before he was mobbed and carried off by an ecstatic crowd gathered to greet him. The lanky flier won a hotly contested \$25,000-prize for his non-stop effort but seemed surprised by the worldwide adulation his flight generated. His main goal, he said, was to further aviation. Bro. Lindbergh was raised at Keystone Lodge No. 243, St. Louis, MO. He was also a member of St. Louis Chapter No. 33, National Sojourners, and of the Scios of San Diego, CA. On the flight to Paris he wore the square and compasses on his jacket as a good luck charm, and his plane also bore a Masonic tag from his Lodge. He died in 1974.

**May 30** - 1922 Chief Justice and Bro. William Howard Taft. dedicated the Lincoln Memorial in Washington, D.C. Bro. Taft had been the 27th President of the US. He was made a Mason "at sight" on June 18, 1909, by Grand Master Charles S. Hoskinson. He became affiliated with Kilwinning Lodge No. 356 on April 14, at Cincinnati, OH, then made Honorary member of Crescent Lodge No. 25, Cedar Rapids, IA.

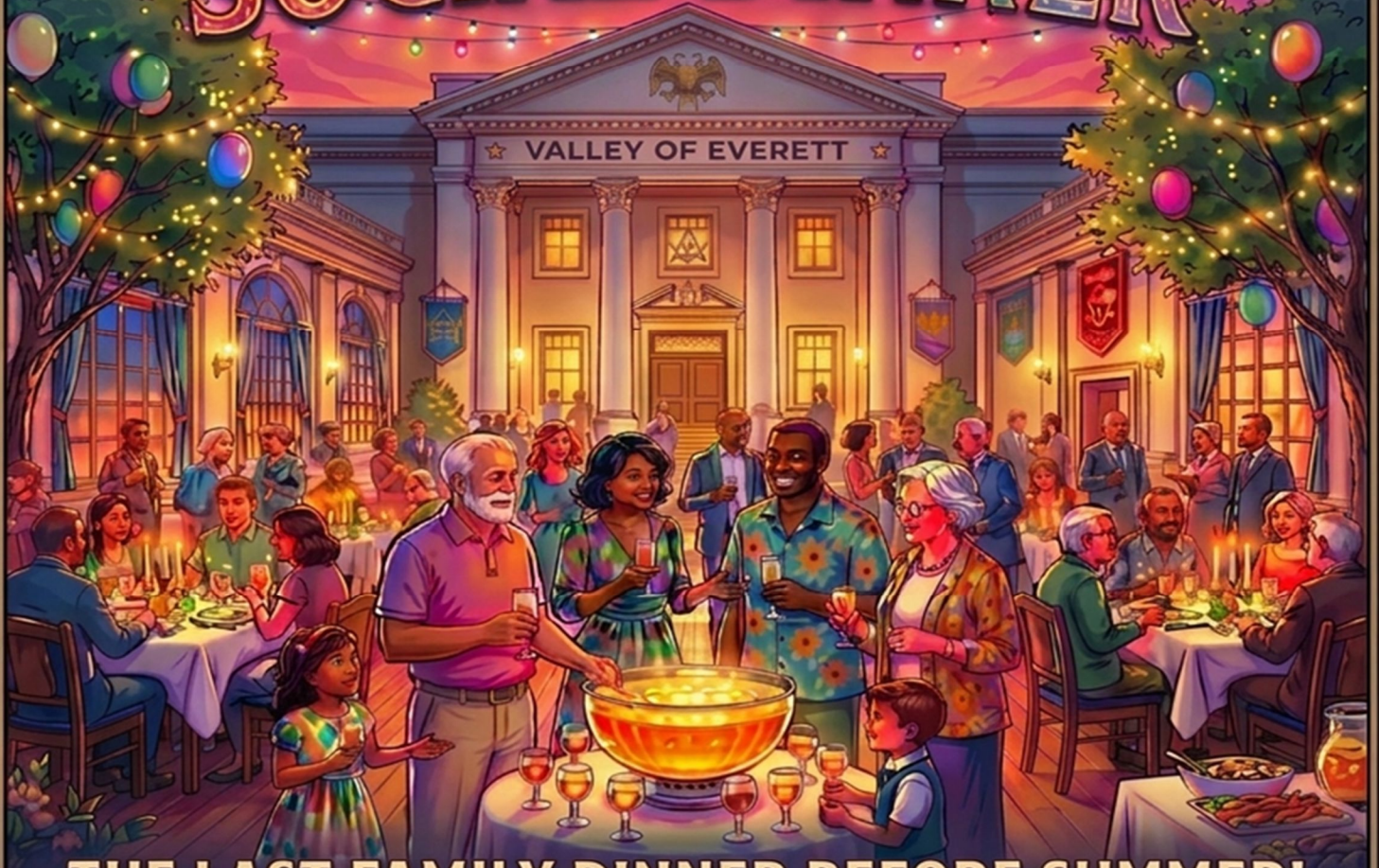

## Memorial Day—May 25th, 2026

Brethren, This is the month that we celebrate Memorial Day which this years falls on May 25<sup>th</sup>, 2026. In my spare time, which is very tight at time I do surf the internet and found this interesting article on how a Freemason by the name of John Logan, and thought that I would share this with all of my brothers and their families



[Logan Lodge No. 575](#) in Indianapolis was chartered in 1888, and is named after [Major General John A. Logan](#), one of the most famous and popular Union Army generals of the Civil War. After the war, Logan became a fierce Republican, an Illinois senator, and presided over the impeachment trial of Andrew Johnson. He was a staunch supporter for the cause of Veterans, and was one of the primary advocates of creating Memorial Day as a national holiday (a day that is important all across America, but [especially here in Indianapolis](#)).

Brother Logan was raised as a Master Mason in Mitchell Lodge No. 85 in Pinckneyville, Illinois.

Memorial Day (originally known as Decoration Day) was officially declared on May 5th, 1868 by General Logan, in his role as national commander of the fraternal group, the Grand Army of the Republic. It was first observed on May 30th of that year when flowers were placed on the graves of both Union and Confederate soldiers at Arlington National Cemetery

# Masonic Biography

## Brother Kenneth J. David (Medal of Honor Recipient)

Freemasonry teaches us that a Mason's duty does not end when he leaves the lodge room. Our lessons are meant to be lived, especially when it is difficult — especially when it costs something. Few stories show this truth more clearly than that of Brother Kenneth J. David, a member of **Cortland Masonic Lodge #529**, 25th Masonic District.

On January 3, 2025, Brother David was awarded the congressional **Medal of Honor**, our nation's highest recognition for valor, presented at the White House by President **Joe Biden**. The medal was bestowed more than fifty years after the day his courage saved the lives of his brothers in combat — a reminder that true merit does not fade with time.

On May 7, 1970, during the Vietnam War, then-Pfc. Kenneth David was serving with Company D, 1st Battalion, 506th Infantry, **101st Airborne Division**. His unit was subjected to a massive enemy assault. The platoon leader was mortally wounded, chaos swept the perimeter, and many soldiers lay injured and exposed.

In that moment — when fear would have been natural — Brother David chose duty.

He handed off his radio and moved forward into the fight. As wounded soldiers were pulled toward the center of the perimeter, he deliberately stepped outside the defensive line, placing himself between danger and his brothers. Again and again, he rose from cover, drawing enemy fire onto himself so the wounded could be treated and evacuated.

Brethren, pause and reflect on that image.

This is Brotherly Love in its purest form — a Mason willingly placing himself in harm's way for the preservation of his brethren. This is Relief — defending those who could no longer defend themselves. This is Truth and Fidelity — remaining steadfast to one's obligation, even at the risk of one's own life.



Though wounded by an exploding satchel charge and nearly out of ammunition, Brother David refused to withdraw. When a medic reached him, he declined treatment so others could be cared for first. He continued to draw fire away from incoming medevac helicopters, ensuring the safe evacuation of the wounded. Only after reinforcements arrived and the enemy broke contact did he allow himself to be evacuated — after first carrying a wounded comrade to safety and providing covering fire until the last possible moment.

In Masonic symbolism, we speak of standing as a sentinel, guarding the threshold. On that day, Brother Kenneth David became exactly that — the living embodiment of a Mason standing between harm and his brothers. He became the cornerstone, bearing the weight so others would not fall.

Brother David did not act for medals, praise, or recognition. He acted because it was right — because others depended on him. That is the heart of Masonry.

His Medal of Honor may have been awarded decades later, but his virtue was complete the moment he chose sacrifice over self. His life reminds us that the working tools of Masonry are not merely symbols — they are meant to shape our actions in the world.
