The History of Freemasons For the Month of June

June 02—in 1897, Bro. Mark Twain, 61, was quoted by the New York Journal as saying from London, "The report of my death was an exaggeration." The line was afterwards frequently quoted. Twain, whose real name was Samuel Langhorne Clemens, was a member of Polar Star Lodge No. 79 in St. Louis, MO. At one point he was suspended but reinstated on April 24, 1867. However, he demitted October 8, 1868 and never again affiliated with any Lodge.

June 06—In 1934, US President and Bro. F.D. Roosevelt signed the Securities and Exchange Act that established the SEC. Wall Street had been operating almost unfettered since the end of the 18th Century. But the stock market crash of 1929 necessitated regulation of the Exchanges. The Commission is composed of five members appointed by the President of the US.

June 08—In 1845, Bro. Andrew Jackson -- a proud Mason who became seventh President of the US -- died at Nashville, NY. He became a national hero when as a major general in the US Army he was ordered to defend New Orleans in the war of 1812. He was elected Grand Master of the Grand Lodge of Tennessee October 7, 1822, and again in 1823, serving until October, 1824.

June 12—In 1929 the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Museum was dedicated at Cooperstown, NY. More than 200 individuals have been honored for their contributions to the game of baseball by being voted into the Baseball Hall of Fame. Of the first five players to be so honored, three were Freemasons: Bro. Tyrus R. "Ty" Cobb of Royston Lodge No. 52, Detroit, MI; Bro. John "Honus" Wagner of Centennial Lodge No. 544, Carnegie, PA; Bro. Christopher "Christie" Mathewson of New York City's Architect Lodge No. 519. The non Masons were Walter Johnson and Babe Ruth.

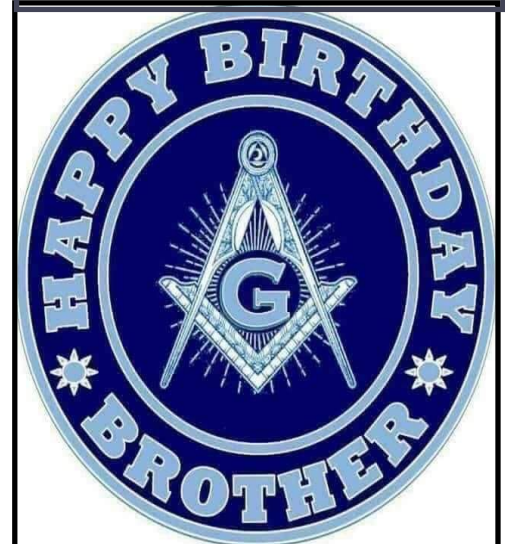
June 13- In 1777, the French soldier Bro. Marquis de Lafayette (whose given name was Marie Joseph Paul Yves Roch Gilbert du Montier) landed in the United States to aid the former colonies against Great Britain. His military career spanned five decades, during which he was a French Musketeer, a commander of American troops, and an anti-Bourbon revolutionary leader. He was commissioned a Major General in the continental Army on July 31, 1777. He became an intimate of Gen. and Bro. George Washington. He claimed to have been initiated in the Loge Contract Social of Paris before he even came to America. He received the chapter degrees in Jerusalem Chapter No. 8 (RAM) September 12, 1824. His son, Bro. George Washington Lafayette received them in the same chapter four days earlier. He was knighted in Morton Commandery No. 4, K.T. and received the Scottish rite degrees in the Cerneau Supreme Council of New York and was made a 33rd degree and Honorary Grand Commander of that body. More than 75 Masonic Bodies in the US have been named after him, including 39 Lodges, 18 Chapters, 4 Councils, 4 Commanderies, and 87 Scottish Rite bodies. He died May 20, 1834.

June 17—In 1742, in Boston, MA, was born Bro. William Hooper, a signer of the US Declaration of Independence. He was a member of Masonboro Lodge in Masonboro, N.C., which ceased to exist in 1787. He died in October, 1790.

Masonic Biography

Brother Joseph Emm Seagram (April 15, 1841—August 18, 1919)

Brother Joseph Emm Seagram was born April 15, 1841, at Fisher's Mills, near Hespeler, now part of Cambridge, Ontario.^[1] He was the son of Octavius Augustus Seagram and Amelia Stiles, who emigrated to Canada from Wiltshire, England in 1837. His parents died when he was a child leaving him and his brother Edward Frowde to be raised by clergy.^[3] For several years, Joseph lived at William Tassie's boarding school (now Galt Collegiate Institute and Vocational School) in the city of Galt (also now part of Cambridge). He went on to study for a Year at Bryant & Stratton Business College in Buffalo, New York.

After returning from school in Buffalo, Seagram worked for a time as a bookkeeper at an axe-handle factory in Galt, Ontario.

He left the position after getting into a fistfight with another employee, going on to work as a bookkeeper at a mill in Galt and managing a mill in Stratford.

Later, offered the opportunity to manage a flour mill (Granite Mills) in Waterloo, Ontario, he learned about the distilling process at Waterloo Distillery, a small aside to the George Randall Company's flour business, using extra grain stocks to make alcoholic beverages. In 1869, five years after joining the company, Joseph Seagram bought out one of the firm's three partners (George Randall) to become Seagram and Roos, then in 1883 became the one hundred percent owner (buying out William Hespeler and William Roos) and renamed it Seagram.

Making whisky became the most important part of the business and Seagram built it into one of the country's most successful of its kind. His 1907 creation, Seagram's VO whisky, became the largest selling Canadian whisky in the world¹ The VO blend, which stood for "very own," was created to celebrate the marriage of Seagram's son Thomas.

Seagram was a benefactor to the city of Waterloo. Among his donations to the community was a 13-acre parcel of land occupied today by the Grand River Hospital. Formally known as the Greenbush, the plot was bordered by Green Street, Park Street, Mount Hope Street and King Street in what was then Berlin. The gift specified that the property was to be used solely for hospital services and open to everyone regardless of race, color or creed.

Seagram was the director of the Economical Mutual Insurance Company for several years.^[2] He was also known for his philanthropic activities including the dona-



tion of 13 acres of land for the construction of the Kitchener-Waterloo Hospital, a gift that was dependent on the facility being "open to everyone regardless of race color or creed. In 1957 the Seagram distillery donated \$250,000 to construct Seagram Stadium at the University of Waterloo.

He served as a Waterloo town councilor from 1879 to 1886. In the 1896 Canadian federal election, he was elected to the House of Commons of Canada as the Conservative Party member for Waterloo North. In the 1900 election he was acclaimed and was reelected in 1904, serving until September 1908 when he chose not to seek another term.

Seagram bought his first racehorse at the age of 16 and arranged to have it compete in

races in Galt. He founded Seagram Stables in 1888, building its bloodlines by importing mares in foal from English sires. Between 1891 and 1898, his stables won eight consecutive Queen's Plates, Canada's most prestigious horse racing event. In total, during his lifetime Joseph Seagram won the race fifteen times, plus his heirs who took over the stable won it another five times.^[8]

Seagram played a role in the creation of the Ontario Jockey Club in 1881. He was elected to the club's board in 1898 and served as president from 1906 until his death.^[1] In 1908 helped found the Canadian Racing Association.^[8]

On its formation in 1976, the Canadian Horse Racing Hall of Fame inducted Joseph E. Seagram as part of its inaugural class in the builder's category.

Seagram married Stephanie Urbs, the niece of Jacob Hespeler, and together they had six children: Edward F., Thomas W., Joseph H., Norman, Alice and Marie, who died as an infant.^[2] The family built and lived in a 65-room home located in Waterloo.¹ Built in 1886 and known as Bratton House, the building stayed in the family until the late 1930s, following the death of Edward in 1937. After sitting vacant for several years it was purchased by the board of Kitchener-Waterloo Orphanage in 1939, operating as the Willow Hall orphanage until its closure in 1960.^[4] The land was sold to St. John's Lutheran Church and the building was razed to build a church that continues to operate on the site.

Seagram died in Waterloo in 1919. He was buried in Mount Hope Cemetery. Brother Joseph E. Seagram was a member of **Grand River Lodge #151 in Berlin (Kitchener), Ontario, Canada**
