From the Desk of the General Secretary

This month, as approved by the Lodge of Perfection, you will be receiving your 2023 \$187 annual dues notification from Supreme Council. Your 2023 Annual Dues are required to be paid no later than the 31st of December 2022.

Annual dues: **2021** \$100 – **2022** \$150 – **2023** \$187- **2024** \$187

As of July 31, 2022 our records indicate we still have ten (10) members due for 2022 \$337 and four (4) still due for 2021 (\$100) and 2022 (\$150) \$437. {plus their 2023 assessment}. In all likelihood - these four will be suspended for non-payment of dues before year end.

Just in case you were not aware - the Orient of Washington (Rite Care \$2 plus \$3 for Scholarship Fund) and Supreme Council (\$30) assesses us a per capita of approximately \$35 per member per year.

That means - if someone does not remit their dues timely that we/The Valley must cover the cost. The Valley now has 186 regular dues paying members, of these – we show 74 Endowed Life Members and 15 50-Year members. Presently - if you are under the age of 75, the Valley can offer you a life membership for \$750. If you are over the age of 75 the cost would be \$500. We expect that in the near future cost (2025) we may need to increase our dues structure to around \$900 and \$600 respectively (to be reviewed at Executive Council Meeting and voted on by the membership at a future scheduled Lodge of Per*fection meeting)*

The History of Freemasons For the Month of September

September 5—In 1874 was born Bro. Harry (Erich Weiss) Houdini, world famous American conjurer and escape artist. His stage performances were legendary, and his books on conjuring were widely acclaimed. He was made a Mason in 1923, in St. Cecile Lodge No. 568, New York City. Master magician, debunker of charlatans Born in Budapest, Hungary, Erich Weiss idolized the French magician Jean Houdin. Altering Houdin's name slightly, Weiss adopted the name Harry Houdini. Bro. Houdini's childhood was spent in relative poverty, and he began to perform professionally at the age of nine on the trapeze. Later he worked as an apprentice locksmith, and was given the task of opening a handcuff, which set him on the path to becoming the world's most famous escape artist. Perfecting methods of escape from handcuffs, chains, straightjackets, and packing cases, Bro. Houdini entertained millions. He also dedicated himself to debunking false "spiritualists" by exposing their deceptive methods. In an attempt to prove once and for all whether or not there is life beyond the grave, he gave his wife a 10-word code before he died. While a number of mediums purported to have been in contact with Houdini after his death, none were able to provide his wife with the prearranged secret message.

September 6—In 1909, American explorer Bro. Robert Peary sent word that he had reached the North Pole on April 6, five months earlier. The final, successful expedition was the fifth of a series he had undertaken Bro. Peary was a member of the New York City explorer's lodge, Kane No. 454. This Lodge was given the Masonic flag which Bro. Peary had displayed at Independence Bay, Greenland, on May 20 and 25, 1895. This Lodge, on March 30, 1920, presented his widow with a special medal in honor of her distinguished husband. Bro. Peary's gift to New York Grand Lodge were two specimens of the great meteorite weighing 90 tons which he had discovered in North Greenland. Bro. Peary died February 20, 1920.

September 9—In 1926, Bro. David Sarnoff incorporated the National Broadcasting Company as a subsidiary of the Radio Corporation of America, and the first radio chain in the United States. Bro. Sarnoff, a Russian immigrant, started work at RCA as an office boy, By the time he became President of NBC he was responsible for the \$83-million in radio set sales by RCA from 1921 to 1924. What finally convinced RCA directors of radio's future was his blow-by-blow coverage of the fight between Bro. Jack Dempsey and Carpentier in 1921. Bro. Sarnoff became a Mason in the Lodge of Strict Observance No. 94 in New York City on June 14, 1921. In June 1955, he received the coveted award for distinguished achievement from the New York Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons.

September 17—In 1787, 39 delegates (many of them Masons) representing 12 of the 13 states, signed the stirring revolutionary document called the US Constitution. Bro. George Washington, who had presided over the convention, afterwards invited the delegates to a farewell supper at the City (Fraunces) Tavern before taking cordial leave of one another. And so was born the document designed "to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defense promote the general Welfare, and secure the blessings of Liberty for ourselves and for our Posterity." Delegations from 12 states (Rhode Island did not send a delegation) at the Constitutional Convention at Philadelphia, PA, voted unanimously to approve the proposed document. Thirty-nine of the 42 delegates present signed it and the convention adjourned after drafting a letter of transmittal to Congress. The proposed constitution stipulated that it would take effect when ratified by nine states. The period between September 17-23 is celebrated as Constitution Week by Presidential Proclamation issued every year since August 2, 1956. Thirty nine men signed the Constitution of which 13 (or 33 percent) were Freemasons. The Masons who signed were: - Bro. Gunning Bedford, Jr., First Grand Master of Delaware; - Bro. John Blair, First Grand Master of Virginia; - Bro. David Brearley, First Grand Master of New Jersey; - Bro. Jacob Broom, an Officer in his Delaware Lodge; - Bro. Daniel Carroll, of Maryland, a Mason who took part in the Masonic cornerstone laying of the US Capitol with Bro. George Washington; - Bro. Jonathan Dayton, a Member of Temple Lodge 1 in Elizabethtown, NJ; - Bro. John Dickinson, a member of a Lodge in Dover, Delaware; - Bro. Benjamin Franklin, Grand Master of Pennsylvania; - Bro. Nicholas Gilman, Member St. John's Lodge 1, Portsmouth, NH; - Bro. Rufus King, Member, St. John's Lodge, Newburyport, MA; - Bro. James McHenry, Member, Spiritual Lodge 23, Maryland; - Bro. William Patterson, Member, Trenton Lodge, New Jersey; - Bro. George Washington, Member, Lodge at Fredericksburg, VA.

September 18 - In 1793 Brother George Washington laid the cornerstone to the U.S. Capital in Masonic style. The silver trowel he used is today housed in a replica lodge room in the George Washington Masonic Memorial at Alexandria, Virginia.

Freemasonry & the Labor Movement in America

The first Monday in September marks the end of Summer and all across the USA, Americans celebrate Labor Day with picnics, parades, and backyard barbecues.

While the first recorded mention of Labor Day was in September of 1882 at a celebration in New York City, it was President Grover Cleveland who signed a decree in 1894 marking the first weekend in September as a national recognition of an official Labor Day as a national holiday.

More than 60 years before President Cleveland signed his new law, a devout Baptist family was celebrating the birth of their baby boy in Cape May, New Jersey. Born on August 3, 1821, Uriah Smith Stephens was a smart and religious-minded boy and studied to become a minister. However, his family was poor and young Stephens had to set aside his dreams and take a job as a tailor to help the family recover from a financial crisis. When he was 25, Uriah Stephens settled for a time in Philadelphia but he was filled with wanderlust. He traveled to Central America, Mexico, and California and then to Europe – working his way around the world for five

In 1858, Stephens settled down in Philadelphia again working as a tailor. An avid reader and life-long learner, he studied economics, politics, history and taught himself several foreign languages.

sues causing cracks in the fellowship.

Stephens was frustrated with the growing disenchant-ment rising from some members of the Knights of Labor who wanted to abolish the secret ritual which Stephens

Stephens also became a Master Mason of Kensington Lodge No. 211 in Philadelphia on March 24, 1865.

Prior to the end of the Civil War, the establishment of trade unions had not found much success. While Stephens had helped to organize the Garment Worker's Union in 1862, it was not until after his personal experiences as a member of Freemasonry that he was inspired to found a new fraternal organization for tradesmen which he called the Knights of Labor.

Speaking to fellow union-minded garment workers in a meeting at his home on Thanksgiving Day in 1869, Stephens presented his concept for a new organization which he proclaimed as the "Noble and Holy Order of Knights of Labor."

This new "brotherhood" would bring together not only fellow tailors but would open membership in Stephens' own words to, "Every laborer, mechanic, and artisan who desired professional improvement, regardless of country, creed, or color." Certainly Uriah Stephens mission was an American-inspired concept of unification that might have found favor with our nation's Founding Fathers!

Uriah Stephens vision for the Knights of Labor was certainly inspired by the ritual and lessons he himself had learned as a Mason in his Philadelphia Lodge. Stephens plan for the Knights of Labor included his being installed as the first "Master Workman" as well as

naming himself as the "District Master Workman" and the first "Grand Master Workman" of the new Knights of Labor.

In creating and founding the Knights of Labor, Stephens freely adapted many of the symbols of Freemasonry and also some of the Masonic ritual into his new organization. The building in which members would assemble was called a "lodge". Members referred to each other as "brothers". Stephens dreamed of a new fraternal network of skilled laborers who would work together as fraternal brothers for the good of their fellow members. Members wishing to join would go through a ritual ceremony led by "Masters" wearing aprons and giving "lectures" on the nobility of labor. Secret signs and symbols were given to initiates as they were sworn to secrecy and loyalty to the brotherhood of the Knights of Labor. Within a decade, the Knights of Labor had expanded from one "assembly" or chapter to 1300 local assemblies. The organization was quickly growing into a large and powerful labor movement.

However, as the organization grew and, perhaps, as Stephens was losing some control over the brotherhood he had conceived and founded, there were polarizing issues causing cracks in the fellowship.

Stephens was frustrated with the growing disenchantment rising from some members of the Knights of Labor who wanted to abolish the secret ritual which Stephens had created. Stephens also was fearful that the new membership was also becoming too aggressive in calling for frequent strikes and union demands.

Seeking to re-establish himself as a labor leader, Uriah Stephens launched a political campaign and stood for election to the U.S. House of Representatives in 1878. As a defeated candidate for the "Greenback-Labor Party", Stephens' star as a labor leader was now tarnished. A year later, he resigned from the Knights of Labor.


Under new leadership, the Knights of Labor grew in power and influence in America as well as worldwide. Membership was opened to what was described as all members of the "producing class" – factory workers, small business owners, and farmers. Those not entitled to membership included lawyers, speculators or anyone involved in "sinful" business enterprises including the liquor industry and gambling. The Knights of Labor membership dwindled in the early 20th century.

So, what became of the first "Grand Master Workman"? Uriah Stephens' reputation with many in the Knights of Labor was still held in high esteem but Stephens at age of 61 was working to create a new fraternal labor-centric organization. It was at his home in Philadelphia on February 13, 1882 that Uriah Stephens passed away and went to meet his maker, as he described as the" Grand Architect of the Universe"

Faith In The People: Andrew Johnson, 32°, President And Mason

Tennessee was "in the middle" during the Civil War and, except for Virginia, suffered more than any other state during the period of reconstruction. Geographically, the North met the South in Tennessee; politically East Tennessee was pro-Union; West Tennessee, pro-



Three Tennesseans, all Masons, have served as President of the United States, and one Tennessee Mason, Samuel Houston, was the first elected President of the Republic of Texas. A statue of Andrew Jackson was erected on the Tennessee capitol grounds in 1880, and James K. Polk is buried there. No public building in Nashville has been named in honor of Andrew Johnson, and no monument to his memory had been erected there until, on October 18, 1995, a statue, a duplicate of the one in Greeneville, was dedicated in Nashville by Governor Don Sundquist.

At the age of 17, Andrew Johnson met Eliza

McCardle, age 15, who taught him how to write. A year later they were married. Mrs. Johnson was an invalid when her husband became President. Johnson, an indentured apprentice tailor, never had the good fortune to experience even one day of formal schooling, but as Governor of Tennessee, he was instrumental in gaining the passage of a bill which, for the first time, levied a tax for the support of public schools in Tennessee. He was a strong follower of the philosophy of Andrew Jackson and believed that government should interfere in people's lives as little as possible. As Senator, he sought to keep Tennessee in the Union, and refusing to resign his Senate Seat, he was the only Southern Senator to remain loyal to the United States.

Johnson served about six weeks as Vice President under Lincoln, then succeeded to the Presidency on April 15, 1865. Trying to carry out Lincoln's designs for reconstruction and reconciliation, Johnson encountered immediate opposition with the Radical Republicans in Congress. He wanted to grant amnesty to Southerners and let them organize their own state governments.

However, Congress did not agree, and Johnson broke with the Republican party. Congress then proceeded to establish its own form of government in the South, giving rise to the hated "Carpetbaggers." On May 29, 1865 Congress granted general amnesty to many former Confederate soldiers, but, apparently because of some Anti-Masonic feeling, Albert Pike was excluded. However, Johnson, on August 30, 1865, Having angered the Democrats as well as the Republicans, Andrew Johnson's power in Washington was broken. Impeachment proceedings against him were held from March 13 to May 26, 1868, but the Senate failed, by one vote, to convict him. When he took his seat as a Senator in March 1875, there were fourteen Senators there who had taken part in the impeachment proceedings, twelve of whom had voted "guilty."

Brother Johnson was the first non-lawyer, non-military person to serve as President. He became known as the "Defender of the Constitution" and often made the remark: "When I die, I desire no better winding sheet than the Stars and Stripes, and no softer pillow

than the Constitution of my country." Johnson's faithfulness to the Constitution, in a time when such devotion was unpopular, is in keeping with the highest ideals of public service and Freemasonry. His many accomplishments, such as the purchase of Alaska, were overshadowed by the impeachment proceedings.

Johnson was a member of Greeneville Lodge No. 119, in Greeneville, Tennessee, and on June 20, 1867, while President of the United States, the Scottish Rite Degrees were communicated to him in the Executive Mansion by Azariah T. C. Pierson, 33, S.G.I.G. of Minnesota and Grand Prior of The Supreme Council, and Benjamin Brown French, 33, of Washington, DC, who was a Past Grand Master of the Grand Encampment, Knights Templar of the United States, and Lieutenant Grand Commander of the Scottish Rite for the Southern Jurisdiction.

He granted amnesty to Pike, who was, at that time, living in Canada.

Ill. French reported the event to The Supreme Council as follows: "We met the president in the room known as the Library, where he invited us to partake of a lunch. We then accompanied him to his sleeping room, where we conferred the Degrees. Illustrious Brother Johnson expressed himself much gratified and said that the doctrines inculcated were such as he had been preaching and practicing all his life." Brother Johnson was the first President to receive the Scottish Rite Degrees.

An active Mason throughout his life, Bro. Johnson remained a member of Greeneville Lodge No. 119 until his death, and he frequently participated in Masonic functions and ceremonies such as cornerstone layings, for example, at the monument of Steven A. Douglas in Chicago on September 6, 1866. As William R. Denslow points out in 10,000 Famous Freemasons (vol. II, p. 299), "his close association with Freemasonry was one of the factors that led to his impeachment trial. Thaddeus



Stevens, the anti-Mason, was a ringleader in the impeachment proceedings against Johnson in 1868."

Brother Andrew Johnson died on July 31, 1875, in East Ten-

nessee. In view of the many attacks upon him from the pulpit, Johnson had requested that no clergy have a part in his funeral, a request that was honored by his family. As he had directed, his body was wrapped in the American flag, which at that time had 37 stars. The first copy of the Constitution which he



owned was his pillow. Special trains came to Greeneville carrying people who wished to pay their last respects to the man who had endured more than any other man in history for the sake of the Constitution. The Knights Templar transported the body under an arch of steel to a grave near Greeneville where Brother U. A. Rouser, a mechanic from Knoxville, served as leader of the Masonic burial service.

Two years later a monument was erected by his children embossed with these words: "His faith in the people never wavered."
