

Labor Day and Freemasonry

Labor Day and Freemasonry share deeper connections than one might initially assume—both rooted in the dignity of labor, the importance of brotherhood, and the building of a better society. Here's a thoughtful overview of their relationship:



1. Origins of Labor Day

Labor Day in the United States is observed on the first Monday in September to honor the American labor movement and the contributions of workers to the development and achievements of the nation. It began in the late 19th century, inspired by labor unions advocating for fair wages, safe working conditions, and reasonable hours.

2. Freemasonry's Respect for Labor

Freemasonry—especially in its symbolic teachings—has always placed high value on labor:

- **Operative to Speculative:** Freemasonry evolved from operative stonemasons, who physically built cathedrals and castles, to speculative Freemasons, who use tools and terminology symbolically. These tools (like the square, compass, and trowel) represent moral labor—the work of building character and society.
- **Dignity of Work:** Masons are taught that all honest labor is noble. Whether one is a craftsman, scholar, or public servant, performing one's duties with integrity and diligence is regarded as a virtue.
- **The Working Tools:** Each Masonic degree teaches moral lessons using the "working tools" of the craft, like the 24-inch gauge (time management), the plumb (upright conduct), and the level (equality), reinforcing the idea that moral and ethical work is as important as physical labor.

3. Masonic Influence on Labor Ideals

Many early American labor leaders were Masons. Though Freemasonry does not involve itself in political or labor movements directly, the principles it instills—justice, equality, and fraternity—naturally align with the goals of the labor movement. Both emphasize:

- **Brotherhood**
 - **Equity and Fairness**
- Improvement of the individual and society**

4. Shared Themes

Labor Day

**Celebrates physical and moral labor.
Advocates for worker rights.
Emphasizes dignity of all jobs.
Seeks improvement on conditions.**

Freemasonry

**Symbolizes labor as a moral endeavor.
Teaches equality and Justice.
All members meet "on the level."
Seeks improvements of man and society.**

5. Reflection for Freemasons on Labor Day

For Masons, Labor Day is a fitting occasion to reflect not just on the rights of workers, but on one's own labor—both physical and spiritual. It is a time to recommit to:

- Living an upright life
- Honoring the value of honest work
- Helping others achieve dignity through their labor

The History of Freemasons For the Month of September

September 06—In 1909, American explorer Bro. Robert Peary sent word that he had reached the North Pole on April 6, five months earlier. The final, successful expedition was the fifth of a series he had undertaken. Bro. Peary was a member of the New York City explorer's lodge, Kane No. 454. This Lodge was given the Masonic flag which Bro. Peary had displayed at Independence Bay, Greenland, on May 20 and 25, 1895. This Lodge, on March 30, 1920, presented his widow with a special medal in honor of her distinguished husband. Bro. Peary's gift to New York Grand Lodge were two specimens of the great meteorite weighing 90 tons which he had discovered in North Greenland. Bro. Peary died February 20, 1920.


September 11—In 1777, the largest engagement of the American Revolutionary War took place between the Continental Army led by Bro. George Washington and British troops led by General William Howe. Howe was marching to take Philadelphia when Bro. Washington chose to try and stop Howe's advance at the Brandywine River near Chadds Ford, PA. The American forces were defeated and the British went on to take Philadelphia on September 26. The British spent the winter in Philadelphia while Bro. Washington's troops suffered the winter through at their encampment at Valley Forge,

September 13—On the night of September 13 Bro. Francis Scott Key was aboard a ship that was delayed in Baltimore Harbor by the British attack on Fort Henry. Bro. Key had no choice but to anxiously watch the battle. That experience and seeing the American flag still flying over the Fort the next morning inspired him to pen the verses that coupled with the tune of a popular drinking song became our official National Anthem in 1931 - 117 years after the words were written.

September 22— In 1901, Bro. Theodore (Teddy) Roosevelt became the nation's 26th President and, at age 42, its youngest. Bro. Roosevelt took the oath of office soon after 58-year-old US President, Bro. William McKinley died from the gunshot wounds received six days earlier from the gun of assassin Leon Czolgosz. Bro. Roosevelt had been initiated on January 2, 1801, passed March 27, and raised April 24 of the same year at Matinecock Lodge No. 806 at Oyster Bay, NY. He was made an Honorary Member of Pentalfa

September 26—In 1796, the Bostonian newspaper "Independent Chronicle" published Bro. George Washington's Farewell Address, the leader's best known speech. The speech, never delivered orally by Bro. Washington, explained the reasons why he did not want to seek a third term as president of the United States. Bro. Washington had arranged to have the speech - his last political will and testament - published in other principle newspapers throughout the country. In it he warned against the rise of "a small but artful, enterprising minority" of politicians whose ambitions and ploys can be fatal to the union. The antidote, he said, is a union of the people, a spiritual union that will transcend party, state or section.

MASONIC BIOGRAPHIES

Ill. Bro. Henry J. Ford, 33°

Born: Thursday, 30 July 1863

Died: Monday, 07 April 1947


Henry Ford was an inventor, businessman, and Freemason who achieved the archetypal role of benefactor of humanity through his innovative practices and endeavors.

“I invented nothing new. I simply assembled the discoveries of other men behind whom were centuries of work. Had I worked fifty or ten or even five years before, I would have failed. So it is with every new thing. Progress happens when all the factors that make for it are ready, and then it is inevitable. To teach that a comparatively few men are responsible for the greatest forward steps of mankind is the worst sort of nonsense.”

In the philosophy of Freemasonry, it is taught that service to others is the highest ideal of life. This does not always have to take the shape of physical charity; innovation, invention, and genius contribute greatly to the condition of humanity and these qualities are cultivated by the Freemason within his Lodge. Brother Henry Ford was one of the 20th century's greatest innovators. Revolutionizing production by applying the principle of the assembly line to car manufacturing, Henry Ford could have simply pocketed the lion's share of the profits from his revolution. Instead, he doubled wages for his workers, cut the cost of his car, and instituted a five-day work week. His reshaping of the auto industry not only improved the conditions for his workers but revolutionized the practice of capitalism globally.

Ford was initiated into Palestine Lodge No. 357 in Detroit, Michigan and was raised to the Sublime De-

gree of Master Mason in 1894. He kept up a Masonic career throughout his lifetime, no easy feat when his many accomplishments and innovations are considered. He eventually received the 33rd and last degree of the Ancient and Accepted Scottish Rite in 1940 - the capstone of many decades of Masonic service.



Ford had a lifelong distrust of bankers, accountants, and financiers and was adamantly opposed to the creation of the Federal Reserve. He tried many social experiments, including creating a department of sociology within his company to investigate the effects of psychology and tradition on his workforce. He constantly investigated, adapted, and innovated in all areas of his work and life, trying to find the cutting edge of everything he was involved in. This spirit of entrepreneurial exploration is an essential quality promoted in the teachings of Freemasonry. Arguably no one has left a greater imprint on the American consciousness than Henry Ford. His spirit of enterprise, self-determination, and his overriding concern for the society around him mark him as a paragon of American culture and a true believer of the Masonic ideals to which he subscribed.
